



There are fifteen original poems, of which the title poem is the longest he has written to date. It presents a startlingly fresh take on climate change, and is followed by a companion essay that will stimulate the reader's critical faculty. Hag's translation of Kazi Nazrul Islam's ebullient masterpiece, "Bidrohi" ("The Rebel") is a tour de force, as is his piquant revisionary version of Hans Christian Andersen's famous tale, "The Emperor's New Clothes". If these are "odds and ends", as the subtitle puts it, they nonetheless add up to an engaging contribution to contemporary world literature.






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Cyber Mage A Novel




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The Aftermath




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Commemorating Sheikh Mujib: The Greatest Bengali of the Millennium Essays



And all the while, in a village some distance away, the author spinning this tale and a one-eyed young boy both witness the true story behind the severed hand unfold.





Based on an eighteenth-century legend from Bangladesh's Noakhali region, Beloved Rongomala follows the fortunes of Rongomala, the charismatic low-caste mistress of zamindar Raj Chandra Chowdhury. The novel introduces readers to enduring characters: the autocratic queen-mother Sumitra; the young gueen Phuleshwari with her bird menagerie; Heera, the queen's chief maid and surrogate mother; feckless zamindar Raj Chandra; and Rongomala, whose rise and fall from grace forms the central arc of the story. Traveling from the feuding kingdoms of southern Bengal, to holy sites in the east, to the flamboyant matriarchal society of Burma, Beloved Rongomala is a story of identity and connection.




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shaheed quaderi selected poems


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imdadul haq milan




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moinul ahsan saber the mercenary, a novel


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rizia rahman




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hasan azizul huq twelve stories








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like a diamond in the sky a novel




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the bird catcher other stories stories




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this path selected poems of Mohammad Rafiq




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calligraphy of wet leaves




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electric shadows short stories




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forty steps a novella
